Whether you are here for the first time, or returning for another year, we are delighted to see you!

Our Chaplaincy is a place of welcome for students and staff alike of UoL, LJMU and LIPA. Along with CathSoc, We have a very full term planned. In addition to the regular weekly events listed above, there are many other opportunities to meet and socialise and explore the Catholic Faith. Some events (marked here with an *) happen here at the chaplaincy, others on UoL campus. The weekday chaplaincy entrance is at the back of church, on Blackburne Place, through the wooden gates.

On Tuesday Mornings, start the day with Morning Prayer at 8am, followed by a shared breakfast.* At 6pm, there is Mass*, and usually CathSoc have an event planned for the evening Wednesdays, Mass is celebrated at Faith Express, the UoL Chaplaincy Office, which is located behind the Hart Building (opposite Starbucks & the Guild) and at the rear of the Foundation Building.

On Thursdays at 5.30pm we gather in the chaplaincy weekday chapel for 30 minutes of prayer, before the Blessed Sacrament, partly in silence, and partly shared prayer, we then have a shared meal together, for which we ask a contribution of $\pounds 1.*$

The student-led Catholic Society ('CathSoc') has a welcome event planned many plans for the term, starting with a welcome evening on Tuesday 3rd October, starting in the Cambridge Pub on Mulberry St at 7pm, later moving to the chaplaincy– Membership of CathSoc is open to all students of UoL, LIPA and LJMU – if you haven't already signed up, please do!

Welcome BBQ Next Sunday, after 6pm Mass, we have our start-of-term – with food and drink for all!

Staff & PhD Group: Will be re-starting for the year in October. We meet every other Wednesday during university term time for a fellowship, prayer and faith-based discussion. Open to all university staff and doctoral students.

Introducing Ourselves!

Hello all – my name is Father Neil, or just Neil if you prefer. I am a priest of the Archdiocese of Liverpool, and have been chaplain here at the universities for almost 7 years. I was a student in Liverpool 40 years ago, at a college which was



long ago absorbed into what is now LJMU. I was originally born in Aberdeen, and was brought up there, and also for a few years in Caithness (the county that has John O'Groats in it!). I graduated in 1985, in Psychology with Education Studies.

In 1983 I had been received into the Catholic Church, along with several other students, in the crypt of the cathedral – we had prepared for this moment at the Catholic

Chaplaincy. In those days it was located in what is now the Hart building, opposite the Guild. I consider my Catholic faith and the relationship it opened up for me with Jesus to be the greatest gift of my life – as well as a set of beliefs it gave me a value system and made me part of a wonderful family. It gave me, in other words, a foundation for my life, which I cannot now imagine life without.

In 1986 I began training to be a priest. I spent 2 years at the English seminary in Spain (despite being a Scotsman!) and 4 years at Ushaw College, Durham, and was ordained in 1992 at St Mary's, Lowe House, St Helen's. After ordination, I spent 14 years working in various parishes around the Archdiocese. During this time I completed a Diploma in Counselling at the University of Salford. In 2006 I was given the opportunity to study for a Licentiate in Theology at the Catholic University of Leuven, Belgium. After that I taught Moral Theology at the same seminary near Durham (Ushaw College) where I'd been a student 20 years before! When Ushaw college closed in 2011, I was invited to join the clinical staff of the St Luke's Centre in Manchester, which offers psychological services to the Catholic Church in the UK and Ireland.

In 2016, Archbishop McMahon asked if I might be interested in becoming university chaplain here in Liverpool, and I didn't hesitate to say yes! Its been a great privilege to serve the university communities. These years have flown by, and I have learned a great deal, not just about chaplaincy in higher education, but about ministry and priesthood in general.

Apart from my ministry in the university communities, I still undertake some psychological assessment work and some therapeutic work. I'm also a member of fraternity of priests linked with the Dominican order, and we meet several times a year. I also have a long-standing passion for flying and the world of aviation – I was lucky enough to be able to get my private pilot's license in 2014 – I love virtual flying too! I also enjoy walking, reading, and films.
